PASTORAL STUDIES INSTITUTE UPDATE

In December, Qiang (pronounced "Chee-ung") Wang was awarded a Bachelor of Divinity Degree through the Pastoral Studies Institute (PSI) of Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary, in partnership with WELS Joint Missions. Here's his story.

Qiang, his wife, Susan, and their son, Ricky, immigrated to Vancouver, Canada, in 2013. At that time, they were Buddhists. Almost immediately after they arrived, Chinese Christians in Vancouver sought to reach them with the gospel.

First, Qiang rejected their efforts. Later he decided that if he was going to debate with them and disprove their religion, he should understand what they believed. He bought a Bible and began reading it. By God's grace, through the power of the Word and the working of the Holy Spirit, Qiang believed. On Thanksgiving Day in 2014, Qiang and Susan were baptized in a local Chinese church. Though he continued to read the Bible on his own, there was much he didn't understand.


At this same time, Geoff Cortright, pastor at Saviour of the Nations, Vancouver, was teaching a Bible study in the building where Qiang lived. One day Susan noticed them in the lobby and asked if Geoff could answer some questions. Qiang had

he learned Geoff was a pastor, he shared his story and his questions about the text's meaning. He and his family soon began worshiping at Saviour of the Nations and were confirmed in September 2015.

The same day as his confirmation, Qiang asked Geoff if he could learn Greek, Pastor Cortright called Professor Sorum, who invited Qiang to attend the Asian Ministry Conference just a few weeks later. Shortly after, Qiang officially began his PSI studies. Geoff became his PSI supervising pastor, with assistance from another WLS graduate who is a lay member in Vancouver, as well as visiting instructors from the PSI team. In 2018, as he began courses in the final level of his Bachelor of Divinity Degree program, he was called to be a vicar at Saviour of the Nations, where he was able to apply what he was learning.

> While Qiang will participate in commencement ceremonies this spring with our WLS students, he officially graduated in December and was assigned by the Conference of Presidents to be a missionary to the Chinese population of Coquitlam, BC, Canada, a growing suburb of Vancouver. WELS-Canada, Saviour of the Nations, and WELS Joint Missions are supporting this outreach effort. Why Coquitlam? City planners estimate that the population will grow by 60,000 by 2026. Half of that growth, they expect, will be Chinese nationals relocating to the Vancouver area. A field ripe for the harvest. Ordained and commissioned on January 18, 2020, Qiang is eager about the opportunities that lie ahead. "My happiest thing," Qiang comments, "is to share the gospel with others." May God bless him as he does just that!

UPCOMING CHANGES FOR GROW IN GRACE

Since the first day of Grow in Grace in 2010, Professor Rich Gurgel has filled the role of director. In the midst of that involvement with Grow in Grace, Professor Kock has already contributed fresh ideas and insights concerning WLS's continuing education efforts. In addition, Professor Kock's master's degree from the University of Indiana is in the area of adult education. All of this has prepared him well to take over the leadership of Grow in Grace.

We look forward to Professor Kock leading the team beginning this fall. We pray for God's blessings on his work as Grow in Grace continues to partner with pastors for growth in all their callings.
