

WINTERIM

CHURCH PLANTING COURSE

Recently, WELS Home Missions launched an ambitious initiative to plant a hundred new home mission churches over the next ten years. For the first time during Winterim, a group of students had the opportunity to participate in a course prepared and taught by WELS Home Missions, with Pastors Jared Oldenburg, Matt Rothe, and Mark Birkholz serving as the instructors. This new course offered a way to help equip men for the unique realities of planting new churches.

Since no community is the same and no mission church is the same, this course challenged seminarians to apply the principles of Confessional Lutheran mission work in several actual WELS mission fields through interviews and interactions with recent seminary graduates who are now serving in the first year of a new home mission. This course was neither a "traditional classroom" nor "boots-on-the-ground outreach" experience, but rather a church planting "lab course" that took place primarily in Fredericksburg, VA, at The Way Lutheran Church.

RETIREMENT

Professor Paul Wendland will step away from full-time service to the seminary at the end of this school year. Called initially as professor of New Testament and homiletics in 2001, he later accepted the Lord's call to serve as president, beginning in 2004. After fifteen years in that role, he returned to the classroom full-time, eager to focus his attention on teaching for his final four years on campus. God be praised for the extraordinary gifts he gave Prof. Wendland and for the many blessings he showered upon the seminary and the synod through his faithful service! His zeal for the gospel, his servant's heart, and his ability to work collaboratively with colleagues will be greatly missed.

The governing board will, Lord willing, address the faculty vacancy by calling a professor of Old Testament and homiletics.

NEW DIRECTOR OF PASTORAL STUDIES INSTITUTE

Pastor Harland Goetzinger accepted the call to serve as the next director of the Pastoral Studies Institute (PSI) and as a member of the seminary faculty. Effective January 1, he has assumed the duties of this position. This call was necessitated by Prof. Jon Bare's decision to accept the call to be the president of Asia Lutheran Seminary. President Bare was commissioned for that work on January 15.

A 2001 graduate from the seminary, Pastor Goetzinger previously served St. Paul, Ottawa, Ontario, Canada. He had also been serving as president of WELS-Canada, as chairman of the Canada Mission Board, and as a member of the WELS Board for Home Missions. "We thank God for giving us the right man at the right time, and we look forward to the blessings the Lord will bestow on Professor Goetzinger's labors," President Treptow said. The Goetzinger family will, as God wills, move to the seminary campus this summer.

SELF-STUDY

The seminary faculty has been actively working on a self-study this year. Professor Kenneth Cherney Jr. serves as the seminary's liaison with the Association of Theological Schools (ATS) and as chairman of the self-study steering committee. Three subcommittees have been assessing every aspect of the seminary's work, with the goal of improving the way men are prepared for service as pastors in WELS congregations and mission fields. The subcommittees have sought feedback from graduates of the seminary, synodical leaders, and members of WELS congregations.

An initial report will be completed, if all goes according to plan, by April. The plenary faculty will review the self-study, consider the recommendations offered, and ultimately endorse a final report. The seminary's governing board, which is responsible for ensuring that the seminary is carrying out the mission given by the synod, will also be asked to review the self-study. After both faculty and governing board have approved the report, it will be submitted to the ATS in the fall of 2023. That will lead, Lord willing, to an onsite evaluation visit by a committee of peer reviewers appointed by ATS in March or April 2024.
